ASPIRING AUTUMN!

Since September, we have launched a number of new initiatives across school to promote not only reading comprehension skills across the entire core and foundation curricula, but also promote a love of reading for pleasure.

Facilitated by Bolton Council and the Three Saints Academy Trust, we have introduced the 'Are You Really Reading' Project. This project focuses on developing a 'toolkit' for





the teaching and learning of reading comprehension skills. The project encompasses five 'strands,' which include:

- · The Timeline Strand:
- The Six-Word Summary/Hashtag Strand;
- The Emoji Strand;
- The Impression and Evidence Strand and;
- The 3/5 Most Important Things Strand.

Teachers and pupils have been employing these strands to develop their understanding of texts in subjects as diverse as Art, Design and Technology and History!

In addition to the 'Are You Really Reading' Project, we have been looking at strategies to promote reading speed and stamina. ALL children should be reading at home using a ruler, lollipop stick or their coloured overlay, if they have been prescribed one!

Since introducing our 'Reading' Scrapbooks,' our pupils responses have been phenomenal!




